CHEMICAL PROCESS INDUSTRIES

The Emergency Response to Chemical Process Industries course is an eight-hour training program developed by first responders, for first responders, to address key issues related to their health and safety at chemical process industry incidents. All emergency response personnel are encouraged to attend. In addition, the course serves as refresher training for all fire fighters – not just those dedicated to hazardous materials response units.

The overall goal of the program is to train first responders to use Analyze, Plan, Implement and Respond (APIE): A Risk-Based Response Process to effectively respond to incidents involving the chemical process industry and reduce responder injury and death. The purpose of the course is to

help decrease the number of injuries and deaths of emergency response personnel responding to chemical process industry incidents.

This course also gives first responders the opportunity to learn new strategies they can use to help decrease injury and death in their departments. Topics include pre-incident planning, as well as the specific actions for each step in APIE: A Risk-Based Response Process.

Development and delivery of the course is funded in whole by a grant from the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), United States Department of Labor (DOL). The goal of OSHA is to enhance the safety and health of emergency responders and reduce occupational hazards.
